The Challenge:

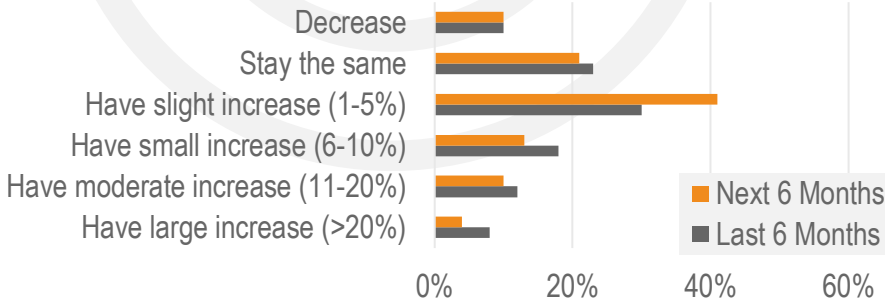

The Solution:

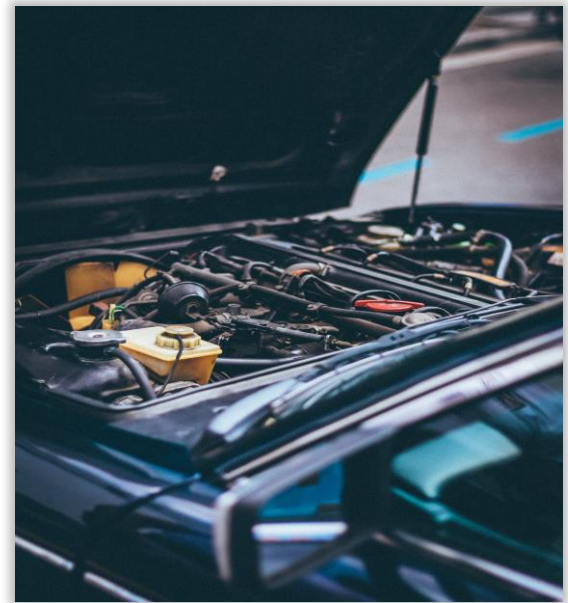
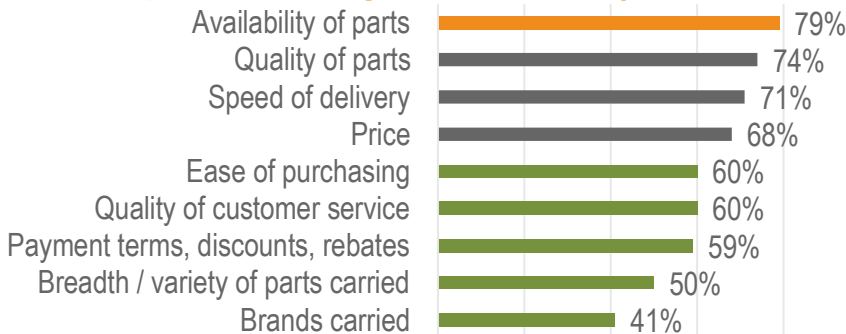
